## 1. Independence National Park

Lots of sites to XPLR: Franklin Court, Carpenter's Hall, Old City Hall, Congress Hall, and the Merchant's Exchange. Remember, most of the buildings are part of the National Park Service and open to the public – go inside!

## 2. Elfreth's Alley

Many claim this is America's oldest continuously inhabited street. Look around, Philadelphians still live in these ceedar-roofed houses. It's only 16 feet wide and has been around since the 1700s – should provide some interesting angles.

## 3. Super Scooper Ice Cream Festival
